Two years ago, the Class of 1957 produced the first memento book for De La Salle Academy. It was a small, unassuming publication, and the editors specifically declined to call it a yearbook, since its scope was so limited. Nevertheless, it contained very good writing and photography, and served as a forerunner of things to come.

The Class of 1958 expanded the publication, which had been called, from the first, The Crusader. Last year's book was broader, both in material and scope. However, it was still somewhat limited, due to its size, and was soft-covered. Most important, The Crusader was advancing.

This year's Crusader is far more wide-reaching in its general content than either of the other two. It can also boast many firsts, not the least of which is a hard-leather cover-version, in addition to the soft covered book. For the first time the book includes a study of the underclassmen in our student body, and covers the extra-curricular activities-religious, athletic, and cultural-much more comprehensively.

For the entire production of our yearbook, we, the editors, are most grateful to many helpers. We must mention especially our staff, the senior class, the underclassmen, the parents and friends of the Academy who were our financial supporters, the printer, the photographers, both professional and amateur, and our moderator, Brother B. Patrick, F. S. C., whose advice was invaluable. Our heartfelt thanks to all these and to the many others who in any way made this book a reality.

BENILDE CLUB

The Benilde Club, or Vocation Club, is a society at De La Salle for those boys who might have a vocation to the priesthood or religious life, and for those who wish to help increase religious vocations by prayer and good works.
